Ementa

Is the fact that we don't deal with actual aliens in our everyday real life – be it angels, monsters or Martians – the reason why we project alienness onto one another? This course, though not ready for answers, proposes questions as such in an investigation of Black speculative fiction. In the words of Octavia Butler, this is “the worst of our problems – the human alien from another culture, country, gender, race, ethnicity. This is the tangible alien who can be hurt or killed.” (The Monophobic Response, 1995)
